
Anderton, who will Register your arrival. But do send in your Application Form NOW - and help the administration of a busy and friendly day run smoothly.

Wendy brought a tremendous range of ideas and stimuli, and showed how dance could relate to work in other areas of the curriculum. We did dances about sailors and invaders, and explored the use of sounds, poetry, pictures, photographs and even articles on geography or science, as starting points.

The days were a great success and the only question in everyone's minds at the end was - when is Wendy coming back again? We hope it won't be too long!

In November Anne Ward held a "taster" workshop for those interested in doing the Dance Leaders' Training Scheme, This also went very well and we are hoping to start a scheme at the end of February. At the moment we are just waiting to hear if applications for grants from the Arts Council and the Educational Training Board in N Ireland have been successful, before finalising,

The next event to look forward to is another Movement Choir on Feb 8th. Sam Thornton is coming over again and this time we are going to tackle Carmina Burana. We have a lovely big hall to work in and are hoping to have it filled.

The work of the Guild Tutors has made a very big impact here, and it is very rewarding to see it providing a focus for all the work that has been done in the past by other excellent teachers, especially Helen Lewis and Musgrave Davidson, to whom all dancers and teachers of dance in N Ireland acknowledge their debt of gratitude,



An occasional series about members of Council

Anna's early dance experiences were in classical ballet and tap, culminating in three years as an RAD scholar. A strong rebellion against the formalities of classical ballet led her to look for an alternative form of dance.

The three year teacher training course offered by the Laban Art of Movement Studio (at Addlestone, Surrey) appeared to be ideal, though her first encounters with Laban's work were not without problems. The long training in classical dance inevitably meant that the concepts of free dance, improvisation and exploration of the medium of movement, were alien and difficult.

It was not until the second year of the course that Laban's theories began to make sense and the concept of dance as an educational force started to have significance and value,

LABAN AT THE CORE
Anna says "I discovered such a
sense of self throughout the
course - through the creative
activity of dance-making - that
a commitment to teaching
Laban's work has remained
strong throughout my career. I
consider now that Laban's
analysis of movement is
absolutely seminal to the study
of dance - it is both
systematic and comprehensive;
and makes for intelligent
dancers."

During her final year, Anna joined the small contemporary company, "The London Dancers", set up by Geoffrey Sutherland, a young lecturer at the Laban Studio. As well as performances in London, the company toured College venues across England. Anna continued to belong to the group until its founder left to work professionally in South Africa.

After graduating at the end of the 60s, Anna became Dance Specialist at an East End Girl's Comprehensive School; and was later offered a Dance Lectureship at Goldsmith's College, where she taught until her marriage,



For the first year of her married life Anna lived in Holland, where she attended classes with the Netherland Dance Theatre. The family then returned to England and Anna retired from dance temporarily, to bring up her children, Lorien and Matthew, who are both now Drama students.

TOWARDS COMMUNITY DANCE
Return to work for Anna was as
a part-time teacher at an Artsbased Primary school, set up by
sculptress Jan Howarth and popartist Peter Blake. This was
also the base for a group of
painters known as the
Ruralists.

While living in Bath, Anna also became involved, as performer and Choreographer, with the Bristol-based Dance in Education group, "Kaleidescope". A growing interest in the field of interelated Arts was furthered, working with Malcolm Ross at Exeter University.

A new career move for her husband saw the family move to Blackheath, and Anna returned to work part-time at Goldsmith's College which was by then affiliated to the Laban Centre. At this time also, she began work at the City Literary Institute, Covent Garden; international invitations began to become an established part of life, and her interest in Community Dance was developing through the classes she organised in South London,

ACADEMIA

In 1983 the family moved once more to the present home in Lewes, Sussex. Anna embarked on the post-graduate MA Course, "Language, the Arts and Education", at Sussex University - "in order to become more articulate about dance education". Her dissertation took her back to Laban's theatre work in Germany, and an aesthetic analysis of "The Green Table" dance work of Kurt Jooss, a former Laban pupil.

Following this, Anna was invited to contribute a chapter on Dance in "Living Powers; Essays towards a coherant Arts Education", edited by Peter Abbs. She has also written the section on dance in "Key concepts - a Guide to Aesthetics, Criticism and the Arts in Education" in the "British Dictionary of Aesthetics", soon to be published.

After obtaining her MA, Anna began to teach Physical Theatre at Lewes College and has since developed GCSE, AS and A Level Dance Courses at the College, There are now over 75 students currently enrolled on these courses, Anna has also choreographed the GCSE

DANCE IN THE NATIONAL CURRICULUM

Some thoughts on the realities for teachers

Gerard Bagley .

Before we dance enthusiasts get carried away in a celebration of dance becoming a mandatory part of the new Curriculum in Physical Education, I am sure that there are more than a few realists among us who are wondering how all this is to be achieved, given the pressures of the vital revisions to the teaching of the basic subjects - with only minimal promise of adequate funding.

DANCE FORMS

DANCE is not adequately defined. By implication it could mean many different things to different people at different Key Stages in the curriculum The term "Dance Forms" of the Interim Report would be far more acceptable in that it embraces all dance-movement forms of participation from the more creative, explorative "Dance Experiences", to more structured forms - unstyled to styled dance.

GYMNASTC

By contrast, the Gymnastic programme gives a far better account of itself, with better progressions between Key Stages 1 - 3 (5 - 14 years).

Many of the recommended activities are equally essential to dance, if not more so. Because of this common ground base and its clearer developmental statement, the Gymnastic recommendations seem to actually weaken the position of Dance as a separate compulsory part of the PE programme; and indeed an extra-curricular (discretionary) status for dance could be strongly argued by class teachers already under considerable pressures.

MARRIAGE?

It is possible that, within Key Stages 1 - 2 (to 9 years), dance and gymnastics could be usefully brought closer together - even merged - in some sort of creative movement/gymnastic programme operating from a firm developmental movement base which is related to the psycho-physical needs, interests and



skills potential appropriate to each level,

Physical education should be involved in assisting the child's developing personality to live "comfortably" within his own growing body; especially in the early years of schooling. The growing awareness of "me in my body" with all its strengths and weaknesses encountered in the development of character in confronting life's contradictions and polarities forms a developmental base from which other skills will grow.

HELPING TEACHERS COPE

Class teachers may more readily identify with this developmental view in an initial creative approach to the child's aquisition of appropriate movement skills in both expressive and later more gymnastic contexts as the threads of the common movement experience divide into more recognisable dance and gymnastic patterns.

At this stage more specialist intervention by the curriculum coordinator may be needed but the burden of the in-service work relating to the earlier years might thus be reduced.

THE THREE THINKS

The National Curriculum advises that children should be encouraged to

"Think about what they are going to do; think about what they have done; think about how to do it better."

Thinking is only one aspect of problem-solving, decision-making process. The Report seems to imply thinking in an applied directly-organised manner; perhaps even convergent. There are of course many qualities of thought, involving fantasy, imagination and intuition.

Importantly the young child's natural free play mode contains elements of randomness, chance, interest, curiosity, combined with imaginative flow in execution. This faculty is a priceless human asset which should be cultivated and harnessed to the problem-solving decision-making process.

Technique without expressive meaningfulness becomes mere action skill. The mastery, understanding and control of expression within a movement is in itself a discipline bringing action skill to movement literacy.

A theoretical physicist without imagination = one "number cruncher". It takes an Einstein to dare to dream-think about how things may appear while sitting on a light-wave!
